The directors present their Directors' Annual Report, combining the Directors' Report and Trustees' Report, and the audited financial statements for the financial year ended 31 December 2023.

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 2014, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their financial statements in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

The Directors' Report contains the information required to be provided in the Directors' Annual Report under the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) guidelines. The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purpose of charity law and under the company's constitution are known as members of the board of trustees.

In this report the directors of Vincentian Lay Missionaries ("VLM" or "the company") present a summary of its purpose, governance, activities, achievements and finances for the financial year 2023.

The company is a registered charity and hence the report and results are presented in a form which complies with the requirements of the Companies Act 2014 and, although not obliged to comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice (Charities SORP effective 1 January 2019), the organisation has implemented its recommendations where relevant in these financial statements.

The company is limited by guarantee not having a share capital.

### Mission, Objectives and Strategy

### **Mission Statement**

To form and facilitate our members to immerse themselves in the experience and culture of the Vincentian mission overseas, so that reflecting on the learned experience, they will, on their return, effect change and transformation both locally and globally.

### **Objectives**

The main objectives of the Vincentian Lay Missionaries (as stated in the Constitution of the Company) is to alleviate poverty in communities in the developing world through the promotion of education, health, poverty and community projects, through the provision of personnel and funding.

The Company is established to do all or any of the following powers for the purpose of attaining and insofar as they are consistent with the main objective:

- I. To raise awareness in Ireland to the needs of the Global South.
- II. To fundraise, to issue appeals, to solicit and receive donations, subscriptions, gifts and bequests of all kinds for the promotion and furtherance of the above objective of the Company and to provide funding where necessary for other similar charitable bodies having their main objectives or purposes wholly or partially similar to those of the Company.

VLM supports this work by sending professional people to share their knowledge and skills. Capacity building of these projects and of their personnel is a key objective of VLM.

#### Strategy

A strategic plan for 2022-2026 has been approved by the Board.

### Structure, Governance and Management

#### Structure

VLM is managed by a voluntary board of management made up of former volunteers, Vincentian priests, representatives of the Daughters of Charity and lay people with specific expertise. VLM is a registered company and a registered charity. The Board is governed by its Constitution and agreed objectives and activities. It was registered on 15 September 2006 as a company limited by guarantee, not having share capital, by the Companies Registration Office, Company Number 426535 and is subject to Irish company laws. Its tax exemption status was renewed by Revenue until 2 October 2024, Registered Charity Number CHY 17070. It has been registered as a charity by the Charity Regulator, Charities Regulatory Authority Number 20062866. The company is registered as an employer for taxation purposes. The governance and decisions of VLM resides in its Board, and is subject to the Companies Act 2014. It is independent in its governance, decisions and operations.

for the financial year ended 31 December 2023

VLM approved individual projects in Africa receive funding from the Irish Government from time to time through the Department of Foreign Affairs (Misean Cara), from the Vincentians in Ireland, from volunteers who self-fund the cost of their training, flights and accommodation, from Board of Management fundraising initiatives and from some individual benefactors who support the work of VLM through personal donations or various fundraising activities. The charity allocates between 5% and 10% of certain donations to a sustainability fund to assist in the running of the charity.

In 2023 VLM continued to observe the high standards for sending overseas volunteers as per the Comhlámh Code of Good Practice, the Dóchas Code on Images, and compliance with the Charities Regulator Code of Good Governance.

### **Charities Governance Code**

VLM complies with the Charities Governance Code issued by the Charities Regulator of Ireland. In 2023, VLM made a submission of full compliance with the Charity Regulator's Code of Good Governance. An Annual Report for the Charity Regulator was completed, reviewed, and approved by the Board at the end of 2023.

### Governance

VLM has a Finance Committee and Governance & Compliance Committees, which oversee the efficient financial, risk management and governance of VLM and report and make recommendations to the board.

### Review of Activities, Achievements and Performance

Key activities in 2023

In 2023, a total of 14 adult volunteer placements took place in Ethiopia, Ghana, Kenya and Tanzania. In June 2023, 12 students and 2 teachers from St Vincent's Castleknock College volunteered at the De Paul School in Thigio, Kenya as part of the schools immersion programme.

VLM staff, board members and past volunteers supported the volunteer placement programmes through recruitment, training, meetings with parents, preparing and attending events and debriefing activities when volunteers returned.

The Board and sub-committees continued to support the organisation's work in the areas of governance, finance, volunteering, social media, and fundraising.

VLM's main fundraising activities in 2023 were a table quiz, Ethiopian Night, African Run Ireland, Christmas raffle and a sponsored school sleep-out. This activity was in addition to supporting the fundraising activities of volunteers and schools for their own placements, and channelling donations from Ireland to our mission projects across Africa.

Volunteers main fundraising activities for overseas projects in 2023 were: €18,767 was raised to buy a school bus for the St Catherine Laboure school run by the Daughters of Charity in Masanga, Tanzania; €9,400 was raised for the Daughters of Charity in Alitena; over €17,000 was raised to build a dining room/kitchen for the De Paul School run by the Vincentian Fathers in Thigio, Kenya. Additionally, almost €25,000 was raised for the Kindergarten in Ambo.

for the financial year ended 31 December 2023

The Ethiopia Deaf Project sub-committee raised €77,391 for the Ambo Lazarist School for the Deaf in 2023, mainly through securing school fee sponsorship for deaf children and through corporate donations for the project. The Ethiopia Deaf Project sub-committee took the decision to establish themselves as a charity in their own right in April 2022 and this was agreed to by the board of VLM. This process is still ongoing in 2024.

2023 also saw work towards building new partnerships and maintaining existing ones. The Coordinator, Madeleine Frissung, travelled to Kenya in June 2023 to develop new opportunities for schools' immersion programmes and adult volunteer placements. VLM started parish collections in 2023 in conjunction with the Daughters of Charity. Six church collections in the Diocese of Armagh raised a total of €7,572 and €5,000 of this was sent to Tigray to pay school fees for children affected by the war.

VLM is continuing to develop and maintain partnerships with Vincentian Fathers and Daughters of Charity projects in Ethiopia, Ghana, Kenya and Tanzania, with opportunities for volunteer placements in all of these countries in 2024. Fundraising continues and VLM has further developed the partnership with Misean Cara through the Vincentian Fathers, securing funding for a needs assessment to take place across projects in Kenya and project cycle management training in Ethiopia. The schools immersion programme was re-established in 2023 with a partner project in Kenya. In 2024, this will involve two schools volunteering in two different schools run by the Vincentian Fathers, opening up this programme for further expansion.

VLM's fundraising activities have been able to take place in person offering increased capacity for fundraising going forwards. A partnership has been established with Realbuzz Running, which gives VLM access to charity marathon places in Dublin and globally.

VLM have begun work updating their constitution and this was completed in February 2024.

#### Financial Review

The results are set out in pages 12 to 21. The surplus for the year of €32,465 (2022 - €24,569) is carried forward increasing reserves to €694,890 (2022 - €662,425).

The Board approves annual budgets and regularly reviews financial performance to ensure the financial stewardship of the charity's activities.

The company does not have a stated policy in relation to holding a defined amount of reserves but plan to approve a policy in 2024. The ongoing fixed support and governance costs are monitored by the board and maintained at a predictable level, which is covered by income. Most of the restricted funds are reserved for large scale capital investment projects.

### **Financial Results**

At the end of the financial year the company had gross assets of €722,605 (2022 - €692,601) and gross liabilities of €28,447 (2022 - €30,176). The net assets of the company have increased by €31,733.

#### Post-Balance Sheet Events

There have been no significant events affecting the Charity since the year-end.

### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

### to the Members of Vincentian Lay Missionaries

### Report on the audit of the financial statements

#### Opinion

We have audited the company financial statements of Vincentian Lay Missionaries ('the Charity') for the financial year ended 31 December 2023 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Summary Income and Expenditure Account, the Balance Sheet, the Statement of Cash Flows and the notes to the financial statements, including the summary of significant accounting policies set out in note 2. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is Irish law and FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102.

In our opinion the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the assets, liabilities and financial position of the Company as at 31 December 2023 and of its surplus for the financial year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland"; and

### 1. GENERAL INFORMATION

Vincentian Lay Missionaries is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in Ireland. The registered number of the company is 426535. The registered office of the company is St Peter's Church, Phibsborough, Dublin 7 which is also the principal place of business of the company. The financial statements have been presented in Euro (€) which is also the functional currency of the company. The company is a registered charity, Registered Charity Number CHY 17070.

### 2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the charity's financial statements.

### Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (Charities SORP in accordance with FRS 102, effective 1 January 2019) and with generally accepted accounting principles in Ireland and Irish statute comprising the Companies Act 2014. They comply with the financial reporting standards of the Financial Reporting Council. The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the charitable company's financial statements.

### Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the company for the financial year ended 31 December 2023 have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102".

### **Fund accounting**

The following are the categories of funds maintained:

### Restricted funds

Restricted Funds represent grants, donations and sponsorships received, which can only be used for particular purposes specified by the donors or sponsorship programmes on the basis that such purposes are within the overall aims of the charity. All other funds received are considered unrestricted funds available for general use as deemed appropriate by the board.

### **Incoming Resources**

Voluntary income or capital is included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the company is legally entitled to it, its financial value can be quantified with reasonable certainty and there is reasonable certainty of its ultimate receipt. Entitlement to legacies is considered established when the company has been notified of a distribution to be made by the executors. Income received in advance of due performance under a contract is accounted for as deferred income (and recognised in creditors) until earned. Grants for activities are recognised as income when the related conditions for legal entitlement have been met. All other income is accounted for on an accruals basis with income due but not received at year end from activities completed in the year, recognised as accrued income. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these accounts.

### **Resources Expended**

All resources expended are accounted for on an accruals basis. Charitable activities include costs of services and grants, support costs and depreciation on related assets. Costs of raising funds similarly include fundraising activities. Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. Governance costs are those associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.

### Allocation of support and governance costs

Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. Support costs include back office costs, finance, personnel, payroll and governance costs which support the charity's activities. These costs have been allocated or apportioned pro-rata to the staffing of the relevant activity.

### **Deferred income**

Deferred income relates to income received in the form of donations relating to activities to be undertaken in subsequent accounting periods.

#### Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost or at valuation, less accumulated depreciation. The charge to depreciation is calculated to write off the original cost or valuation of tangible fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives. The estimated useful life of the fixtures and fittings is 5 years.

#### **Debtors**

Debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due. Income recognised by the company from government agencies and other co-funders, but not yet received at year end, is included in debtors as accrued income.

#### Creditors

Creditors are recognised where the company has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

#### Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand comprises cash on deposit at banks requiring less than three months notice of withdrawal.

#### Taxation and deferred taxation

No current or deferred taxation arises as the company has been granted charitable exemption. Irrecoverable valued added tax is expensed as incurred.

No charge to current or deferred taxation arises as the charity has been granted charitable status by the Revenue under Section 207 and 208 of the Taxes Consolidation Act 1997, Charity No CHY 17070. The charity is eligible under the "Scheme of Tax Relief for Donations to Eligible Charities and Approved Bodies under Section 848A Taxes Consolidation Act, 1997" therefore income tax refunds arising from sponsorships exceeding €250 per annum are included as donations in unrestricted funds.

### Foreign currencies

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. Transactions, during the year, which are denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rates of exchange ruling at the date of the transaction. The resulting exchange differences are dealt with in the Statement of Financial Activities.

### 3. CRITICAL ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENT AND ESTIMATES

Preparation of the financial statements requires management to make significant judgements and estimates. The directors are of the view that there are no items in the financial statements where significant judgments and estimates have been made.
